The club can call on the services of nearly 50 qualified officials: starters, starter's marksmen, timekeepers, track judges and field judges, led by Roy Campbell (starter), Nick Folwell (timekeeper), Diane Baldwin (track judge) and Richard Pownall (field judge). Russell Rose has taken on the job of organising the marshals for the club's road races. We do encourage members to qualify as officials and will pay the course fees for those who wish to qualify.

For the last 25 years the club has been responsible for managing the Athletics Stadium at Stantonbury out of school hours: David Millett looks after bookings; Jack Kee and Peter Hall manage the facility and look after the equipment; Kelvin Smith and Paul Toombs look after the grounds maintenance. Wendy and Matthew Durand look after the clubhouse kitchen. Kevin Church is looking after club kit.

Brian Graves has edited the club newsletter for the last 30 years. He also writes the press reports and takes lots of pictures for the website.

Jackson Ryan organises the annual Awards Evening.

I have listed these people to give some indication of the enormous amount of work that goes on behind the scenes on a voluntary basis. (I will have also inadvertently omitted some other volunteers who also do a great job — I do apologise!)

I would like to thank everyone for their contributions to the club and would encourage other club members to show their appreciation of the work done by thanking volunteers for their services. It can make an enormous difference if their services are appreciated!

Cross Country

The cross country season is now well under way and the first three Chiltern League matches have been held. In the first two matches, at Oxford and the Teardrop Lakes in Milton Keynes, the Club won overall by narrow margins. In the third match Bedford turned out, in particular, a very strong Senior Men's Team. While we had a magnificent 10 runners home in the top 43. Bedford closed in on 39th. They now lead overall by the small margin of 10,746 to 10,660. Nevertheless, the Men's Team are still comfortably ahead. The Senior Women, after a shaky start at Oxford, now hold a slender lead over Dacorum & Tring. I would encourage every endurance-based member of the club to take part. It is free: you just need to pick up a number. The next match is at Keysoe, north of Bedford on 13 January. With your help, we can still retain the overall league title. This match also incorporates the Club Championships and medals will be awarded to the first three MMK runners in each age category.

The County Cross Country Championships will be held at Old Warden Park, Shuttleworth, near Biggleswade (**SG18 9EA**) – only 40 minutes by car from Milton Keynes – on Saturday 6 January. As in previous years, the club will pay the entry fees for all athletes who wish to enter. You don't need to fill in the forms that are on the Bucks AA website as I can cut and paste the required information from the club's database into a spreadsheet. What I do need are the names by Wednesday 20 December at the latest, to give me time to complete the forms. You can (preferably) email me at the address below or leave a note in the clubhouse office. Only paid-up members can be entered.

The South of England Championships will be held at Stanmer Park, Brighton, on Saturday 27 January. The closing date for these Championships is on 15 December. Please let me know if you wish to be entered for these championships by Thursday 14 December.

Milton Keynes Festival of Running - 11 March 2018

The Milton Keynes Festival of Running is on Sunday 11 March, with races over 5km, 10km, Half Marathon and 20 miles, all starting and finishing in the same area, and all largely using the same course. We are committed to supplying over 100 helpers for this event, the profits from which fund much of the work that we do. This year's event raised over £16,000 for club funds. Please note the date in your diary. The 20 mile race will incorporate the Buckinghamshire Long Distance Championship.

Annual General Meeting

The Club's Annual General Meeting was held on Tuesday 14 November in the clubhouse. Fortunately all the positions on the Committee have been filled, and we will have a strong team of volunteers to manage the club.

35th TOUR OF MILTON



ANDREW WASDELL REVIEWS HIS WEEK

his years' Tour of MK (the 35th!) took place back in September and was one of the most highly attended tours of recent year. As always, the preparation was a little fraught with me looking at the entry details every day, trying to work out how many t-shirts I may or not need, worrying over the slow response of volunteers to help with the week, worrying about the weather and if the chalk marks will be washed away etc...needless to say, Russell Rose did a great job of finding marshals, we had enough t-shirts for the 105 6 day tour finishers and Paul/Kelvin ensured that no-one got lost!

I probably put a little more pressure on myself during tour week by organising and participating in the event at the same time....I think doing one of them would be easier...but taking part is one of the things I enjoy about the event, plus, if I didn't organise it, then I'm not sure if anyone else would (if you are willing to help organise next years' event then please let me know as it would be good if someone else could assist with some of the duties).

This years' event was slightly different for me as one of my main goals for the autumn was to run Leicester marathon on the 15th October, so I treated the Tour as a hard training week, knowing that on the end weekend I needed to go out and run 20 miles...so there was a little less pressure to race hard in every race....which obviously was in my mind at the start of the Tattenhoe race but then went out of the window by the time we got to the Willen race!

By the time the Willen race ends I am ready to have a pint (and food...but it was all gone by the time I went to eat!) and it is great to see so many participants, marshals and supporters with friends and family who stay on to have a few drinks and talk about their running prowess (or lack of!) and where they may have gained or lost those precious few seconds which affected their performance against everyone in their section of the race.

For next year I'll aim to keep to the competitive and friendly spirit of previous years, but there are some things that I'm considering changing (such as a slimming down of the MMKAC trophy awards on the Fri night...most will be awarded the following Tuesday session.and potentially no on the night entries for most of the races...) and these things will be decided over the next few months... that said, next years date is now fixed, Sunday 2nd to Fri 7th September, and on-line entry is now available (link for members on the website).

Can I say a huge thank you to everyone who participated in the Tour and an even bigger thank you to everyone that helped put this great event on. This is an event that gets us known throughout the MK running community and encourages new members to come down to join the club...we also generate a profit to subsidise club activities..so the hard work pays off!

Tour review - Max McCaffrey

It was with mild trepidation that I signed up for the Tour of MK, six days of consecutive running across various disciplines including track and cross country sounded rather challenging, especially for a guy who rarely runs one day after another and who has been known to over indulge in a cheeseboard or two.

My father's 20 year old t shirt from his Tour of MK was a hallowed item and the fact that he had only completed one iteration of the Tour was taken by me as a warning sign to how intense this event would be.**

Spurred on by a friend and fellow runner, we both decided to undertake the challenge and wow, I am extremely pleased I did.

I think the highlight of my Tour has to be the track day, my first go at running round a track since school, the atmosphere was electric with cheering from my fellow runners, other highlights include the climb up to Campbell Park which was tough going, making the downhill section so very much welcome, the running through water and clambering up the bank beside a perfectly functioning bridge on stage two, and the tough hills of Brickhill Woods to endure, which offered a completely new running experience.

Thanks to the Tour of MK, I know that I can cover in excess of 20 miles a week (I normally average around 10/14) and have a new interest in running not just on redways and paths but also 'off the beaten track' and indeed on track!

All runners were welcoming and friendly, the routes diverse and challenging in an enjoyable way and a well earned t-shirt and buffet at the end of the week topped it off. Again, many thanks to all that played a part in putting on such a fantastic event and those that ran it with me.

Campbell Park was tough this year, with a ridiculous stitch leaving me unable to breathe properly (you may know that this is quite important when running...well and just generally living). Oh - another PB...!

The woods...still bloody hard but as always - it is short and sweet, and I managed to pull another PB out of the bag.

And before we know it, its the last day! My legs were definitely feeling it, so my tactics didn't quite work for this race. I wanted to push my pace to the lake, ease around Willen and then pick up the pace again to the Pavilion. I didn't quite manage the last increase in pace, but it didn't really matter...because it was finished and it was time for snacks ')

I finished 26 minutes up on last year - which isn't necessarily surprising as a result of those blisters. BUT I was also around 4 minutes 30 seconds quicker than my 2015 time having run a PB in every race this year apart from the track. So I get to look after the 'Most Improved' trophy again for a year:)

Finished the week feeling very proud of Jon, who won the tour overall! Our mantelpiece will be looking somewhat more shiny with our trophies this year!





HELVELLYN TRAIL CHALLENGE (15KM)

- 14 OCTOBER



LAKELAND TRAILS

Chris Ryder reports

"Lakeland Trails are some of the most inspiring trail running and walking events in the UK, all held within the spectacular landscape of the Lake District National Park." This is the claim of the organiser and who am I to disagree? This was my third - (Coniston marathon and Cartmel 18K completed) and I will be back in 2018 for another t-shirt.

You know you are in for an interesting event when the organisers mail you the day before to tell you the car parking is all flooded & they are transporting people to the start (by canoe). However with some local knowledge we dutifully ignored this and managed to park a short distance from the Glenridding lakeside start. The temperature was mild and of course there was some precipitation –it's the Lakes! Off we set and in a short distance we are climbing past Helvellyn YHA and then following the miners tack, soon taking in gorgeous views of Ullswater.



There were three in our group —Hazel Cockerill, Malc Kidby and myself and we kept pretty much together and took photos en route...after all what's the point in blasting along the route and not taking in the scenery (that's our excuse any way!) The track was mainly disguised as a stream for most of the route, which was a plus really, as the previous Cartmel experience had been knee deep mud. We all ran across the line together and then strolled up to the pub for a mandatory pint of local ale...medically proven to be a great recovery drink.

The "Challenge" events are for the more leisurely runner whilst the "Race" guys eventually zip past towards the finish...and have the good grace and breath to tell us "well done". These events are low key and well marked, marshalled. There are a few grumbles about not very secure bag drops and not a lot of food left for the tail enders...but the routes are splendid, and we even had what amounted to a crowd as we left Glenridding (At least 12 people & 2 dogs) A lot different to a popular road race but in my mind, way more enjoyable. "VARIETY IN RUNNING" - URSULA GHALEB SHARES HER IDEALS

y first race in the season was the Bledlow half marathon — an undulating trail course. The weather prior to the race was very wet and the run was just a mud race. I honestly can say that I did not enjoy sliding down the path in the mud and making sure not to slide backwards on the uphill. I took nearly 3 hours. Luckily a few of us went and they cheered me up afterwards.

End of April I went to Windermere to take part in a weekend hill training course. Anxiously I arrived and joined the group. We were 4 runners and one leader. We ran in the Loughrigg Fells and Kentmere area. It was a huge challenge for me. We were out for 6 hours each day and I learned how to tackle a hill run and the importance of keeping an even pace. It was a very informative weekend. The following Saturday I took part in the Staveley 17mile trail race in the south of Cumbria. I managed to keep a fairly even pace and finished in 2:08. I developed terrible cramps in my leg on the downhill run and instead running smoothly with my head high into the finishing line I just about ran/hobbled the last km.

Next challenge was Fuessen Marathon in beautiful south Bavaria. I felt well prepared and knew that the scenery will keep me going. I managed half way in 2:05 and I felt I was well on track to finish under 4.30. However, on about mile 20 I developed cramp in my leg and by the time I was on mile 21 I had cramp in both legs and toes. I hobbled along but had to give up mile 21.5 as I could not support myself any longer. I was very disappointed that I reached the finishing line by ambulance — I was not a happy person.

Beginning of September, I ran with Jim and Brian in Slovakia and we all completed the World Masters Mountain running championship. This was a brilliant event. It is wonderful to meet runners from different countries especially as I now know some of the German athletes. Speaking my mother tongue is always a bonus for me. There is a great comradeship amongst the runners. Anyone aged 35-79 can take part. Slovenia next year!

A dozen of us ran the annual Ridgway 15km in the Chiltern Hills and

there were no less than seven ladies! (Ursula, R)

I thoroughly enjoyed the different terrains of my races and come to the conclusion that trail running is my preference and my now older body appreciated it more than road running. I learned more about my pacing and endurance level this season which hopefully will help me to complete in future races.







We flew to Bratislava and then by train north to Dubnica Nad Vahom(not far from the Czech Republic border). Next day we walked the course with temperatures in low 30's. Fortunately the forecast was correct for race day dropping to a more racing friendly mid-20's. As can be seen from the course profile we had a climb of just under 600m within the 9.6km course length, certainly for most very runnable.

Ursula completed her fourth consecutive World Masters event, 14th in the F60 age group(71.43) whilst Jim, in his second event, ran well considering he had just got over a bout of shingles – 36th M65(74.59). Brian (the third oldest competitor) placed 19th in the M75 race(1:49.17) for his 20th World Champs completion and with his dodgy right knee was more than happy to find a relatively easy course. Next year Slovenia host the Championships where the course looks like being much

My fell running career commenced back in 1977 (The Yorkshire Three Peaks..........40 years ago(?). I had subsequently then raced in the Lakes, North Wales, Peaks etc. but had limited knowledge of what happened in Europe. I noticed in the 1989 fixtures list the above international race mentioned with an accompanying "open" race for others. This was the Grisedale Horseshoe Race – 16km/1500m climb. Dave Findel-Hawkins, Kevin Farmer, Howard Pattinson, Sam Kirkpatrick & myself all ran. The international race, over the same course, followed with Italians 1 and 2; over the subsequent years we got well used to hearing the Italian National Anthem!

So the die was cast. I then competed in the next nine Championships, same format as in Keswick. 1990 in the French Alps then onto to the Stubai Valley(Austria). Zermatt(Switzerland), Susa(Italy), Gap(France), Scotland (Edinburgh), Germany, Austria(Stubai) and no10 in the Czech Republic. The World Masters Champs started in 2001 and came back to the English Lake District in 2005. The 2007 race above the Rhone Valley in Switzerland saw us finish at around 2000m, on an all-weather track. A swim in the local outdoor spa followed.



Mark Featherstone, pictured below, equalled the M50 EMAC League record with his leap of 1.58m. This is also a club M50 record and the second best all-time by a veteran; Andre Sinclair-Linton(M45) cleared 1.60m in 2015. In the M50 rankings Mark is now no.1 in the shot(12.10m/6kg) and 2nd in both Discus (38.74m/1.5kg) and Javelin (38.82m/700gm).



Paul Canning(below) is now no.1 in the M50 200m rankings with a time of 25.71 and moves to 3rd in the 400m(60.4). He holds the 100m record with 12.1 from 2016.



Jan Hardcastle(above R) competed in no less than seven events at Bedford. $-2^{\rm nd}$ in the triple jump; $4^{\rm th}$ in the 200m, 80mHurdles and high jump. $5^{\rm th}$ in the long jump and $7^{\rm th}$ in the 100m plus a 200m leg for the relay team that placed $3^{\rm rd}$.





- ♦ 255 finishers nearly 50 up on last year.
- The winner, Kevin Seaward(Cardiff), ran 24.05, 25-seconds quicker than when he won two years ago. He now places 20^{th} in the all-time rankings for this course.
- Rosie Keane (Luton) won the ladies race in the 10th best (28.10) ladies time on this course. Rosie, seen here in the front row of the start photo, is actually in front of eventual winner Kevin Seaward who is just to the left (with white cap) of Ryan Burling.
- ♦♦ A unique husband and wife "first MMKAC finishers" from Mark and Linsey Ryall. Pictured right with Rose Callow who has officiated at every single Wolverton 5 since 1965.
- ♦♦ Mark placed 6th overall and his time of 26.04 places him 18th in the club all-time rankings for this course. Graham Jones came home 7th(26.09) and moves to no 20. Linsey and Wendy Webber had a good dual in the race, 8th and 9th ladies/3rd and 4th F35. More PB's from James Tuttle(26.21) and Jamie Seddon(26.31).
- ♦♦♦ Great to see Chad Lambert running. Chad, through injuries, has not raced seriously since May 2014. He ran 3.53.01 for 1500m in the British University Championships at Bedford that year.
- ♦♦ Two age group winners: Diane Baldwin was first W60 in a time of 35.15 (her club record is 34.54 set at Banbury last year). David Newens took the M70 prize clocking 36.57. Only the late John Greenall has run quicker 35.33 in 2006. Both pictured right.
- ♦♦ In the accompanying EMAC Championships we had four on the podium. Winners were Diane Farmer(F55) and Diane Baldwin(F60) plus Simon Kirschner-Heavens(M35). Chris Finister placed 2nd M40.
- ♦♦ Teamwise Bedford men beat us by just 41-seconds: 104mins15 to 104mins56 (four to score). We won the ladies and both veteran categories.
- Sadly the percentage of runners breaking 30mins is still averaging around 20%. This year it was 21.8. Average over last six years is 21.8%. In 1991 when the race was first held at Willen we had a field of 257 but 46% broke 30mins. This goes with the national average of declining performances. Still the show must go, as they say and we can only hope......
