Chair's piece

Track Season

At the beginning of the year, it looked very doubtful that we would be able to hold any athletics meetings this summer, but as the covid-19 situation improved and research suggested that outdoor activities were relatively safe provided social distancing guidelines were followed, we gradually started to plan for a full summer of athletics, albeit with a late start. Other clubs have struggled to get going again and many councilowned stadiums were very late in reopening as track operators preferred to furlough their staff rather than reopen for business. One of the advantages we have in managing our own stadium is that it is our responsibility to decide when and how to reopen. We have worked within government and UKA guidelines to lead the way for many other clubs. I pay tribute to the coaches who have maintained contacts with their athletes throughout and helped them get fit again after the extended lay-off. I also pay tribute to the grounds-maintenance team, our officials and our team managers who have worked hard to provide opportunities for competition. We have hosted meetings almost every weekend between mid-May and the end of September - more meetings than we would normally host - as other clubs and competition providers have found it difficult to host.

Grounds Maintenance

The club has been responsible for all grounds maintenance at the track since 1998. The last eighteen months have been difficult with little athletics activity in 2020. The club has worked to sort out some of the long-term issues and we now have new LED floodlights, two refurbished and safety compliant hammer cages and a new terrace in front of the clubhouse. We have also held two volunteer days in April and September with over 25 club members turning out to help with weeding, pruning, and tidying. It's amazing how much difference these days make to the look and feel of the stadium. If you were there – thank you!

SOAR MK Relays

When the South of England Road relays were cancelled on 16 September, just 10 days before they were due be held at Crystal Palace, South London, I received an email from Mike Boucher (Aldershot) asking whether we could take it on. We held a Zoom meeting that evening, just after the Chiltern League AGM, and decided to see whether it was feasible. I wrote to the SEAA the next day offering to hold the Championships in Milton Keynes but was told that it was too late to do anything. Plan B went into operation with us hosting the SOAR MK Relays – Mike would sort out the entries and sponsorship, with entries opening 24 hours later, and Jackson Ryan and I would look after the course, permits, toilets, catering, officials and so on. I wrote to all my contacts in the Southern Athletics League,

Chiltern League and East Midlands Grand Prix to publicise the event, with Paul Mizen and Elliot Hind active on social media. We managed to attract 243 entries in just four days and held a memorable meeting with lots of very appreciative teams. We also made over £1800 for the benefit of the club. Thanks to everyone who was involved in this event – a demonstration of what the club can achieve in record time, that would be beyond most other clubs.

Cross Country

As the track season winds down, so the cross-country season begins. Our focus as a club is on the five matches in the Chiltern League, starting with the first meeting at Horspath, Oxford on Saturday September. To be successful in this league we need to get large numbers of runners out for each race in every match. Please try to be there. The second match on 13 November will be at the Teardrop Lakes, Milton Keynes (organised by Leighton Buzzard) and the fourth match will be a home match in Campbell Park on 15 January, which will include the club championships. These are great social events as well as keenly fought sporting contests. Despite the social distancing restrictions, I hope that our many athletes, parents and friends will support all the members of the Club, cheering them on and encouraging them to do well.

Stantonbury International School

On 1 September the School changed hands with the Tove Trust taking over responsibility for the management of the school.

David Millett, Bryan Waddington and I attended an early meeting with the Trust and with Ben Wilson, the Associate Principal. We were very impressed by their commitment to working with us to develop opportunities for their students to get involved with athletics at all levels and to make much better use of the stadium. We look forward to working with them.

Five-year Plan

The club committee has been holding meetings to formulate a five-year plan for the club, to determine what our priorities for development will be over the next few years. We hope to report on progress at the AGM next month.

Annual General Meeting

This year's AGM will be held online on Wednesday 17 November. If you want to put forward a motion, or if you are thinking of standing for one of the positions, please talk to Club Co-Chair, David Millett, or me. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the members of the Committee for their work on behalf of the Club.

Paralympic Heritage Flame Lighting Ceremony

The postponed 2020 Paralympic Heritage Flame Lighting Ceremony took place on Thursday 19 August 2021 at Stoke Mandeville Stadium, the birthplace of the Paralympic movement and will form part of the five-day-long official Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Torch Relay.

The torch was lit for the first time in Tokyo in August 2020, based on the "Share Your Light" concept of the Paralympic Games.

Uniting tradition and modern technology, the shape of the torch resembles that of a Japanese traditional "Sakuramon" cherry blossom emblem. The name of Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games mascot SOMEITY and its design also come from this flower. It was shaped into this form using the same aluminium extrusion technology used in the manufacture of Shinkansen bullet trains. It forms a seamless, single piece in a form that symbolises the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Torch Relay, created by fusing Japanese tradition and modern technology.

The manufacture of the torch embodies the spirit of recovery and consideration for sustainability. Aluminium construction waste from temporary housing built in the aftermath of the Great East Japan Earthquake was used to create it, transforming materials that witnessed the rebuilding of shattered lives into a symbol of peace. This will convey to the world the extent to which the affected areas are recovering, one step at a time.


The torch is also designed to depict the shape of a flame. The five flames generated from the petal unite at the centre of the torch, generating even greater brilliance

EARLY HISTORY

In 1948 Dr Ludwig Guttmann (knighted in 1966) organised the first competition for wheelchair athletes which he named the Stoke Mandeville Games. He held this competition on the same day as the opening ceremony of the Olympic Games in London, and 16 injured servicemen and women took part in an archery competition.

Eventually the games expanded to include more sports and evolved to accommodate athletes from countries all over the world. In 1960 the International Stoke Mandeville Games officially became the Paralympic Games in time for the 1960 summer games in Rome.

Stoke Mandeville, being the birthplace of the Paralympic movement, now hosts the flame lighting ceremony for each games, and has done since 2014

BOB BEALES 1939 - 2021

KAC joined the Southern Women's League in 1981 and were members until 2010 when they joined the expanding UK Women's League. Bob was the SWL team manager for eleven years [1988 to 1998]. He was joint manager alongside Les Huxter in 1988. Unfortunately they were relegated from Division 2 but inspired him to lead them back in 1989.

Early days: Bob was born in August 1939, just prior to the outbreak of the second world war. Involved, probably like many of us from that era with school football and cricket and then represented Harrow Schools in both 100 and 220yds at Borough sports. Leaving school he joined the Merchant Navy in the midfifties and "travelled the world" - his words!!

On his return met his wife to-be Jennifer. Once married he turned his hand to motor cycling racing; side-car racing to be exact. Frances was born in 1963 but they continued to race......

I quote from a special Isle of Man TT edition of the Daily Mail. "Mum may be a sidecar passenger - like Jenny Beales - but her maternal instincts are not impaired by a job that is dangerous" In 1966 he made the Daily Express "I must be one of the luckiest guys to have a wife like Jennifer who enjoys motor sport"

However a serious accident with his 650 Triumph outfit at Mallory Park ended their career......Bob hit the track banking at about 80mph and both were thrown from the motor-cycle. Between them they had leg, ankle and arm injuries.

They moved to Bletchley in 1970 and Emma was born a year later; son Robert followed two years later. Bob turned his hand to Badminton with successes for Old Leon Badminton Club and involved with coaching the ladies team.

With Emma beginning to shine at athletics through Leon School and MKAC, Bob gradually got more and more involved with our sport. Emma joined MKAC in 1986 and her all-round ability was shown as she competed in the under 15 age group in the 200m, Long Jump, High Jump, Javelin and set club records in the Shot(10.04m) and Discus(31.23m) through the season.

The team gained promotion to Division 2 in 1986 and held on in 1987. Unfortunately it was demotion in 1988.. Bob was learning the "hard way" as they say.

Bob had vowed to get the team straight back up. And so they triumphed - they won all six matches with the bonus of hosting the final match; the very first event on the new track at Stantonbury!

Who would have written head-lines like this five months previous. Rita Quill was presented with the League Trophy and then Bob was thrown ceremoniously into the water-jump.

AND NOW FOR DIVISION ONE


Yes, finishing second in 1990 to Bracknell. They won five matches, only losing to champions Bracknell, and that was the first match at Bracknell! Bob had completed five years with the MKAC club committee and along with managing the SWL team he was awarded the "Club Person of the Year" trophy at the 1990 awards evening.

1991 and 1992 saw mid-table positions in Division One. Very worthy of note is that in 1992 both Emma Beales and Nicola Crowther turned-down international appearances clashing with the final set of league matches to help secure their Division One status. Unfortunately relegation in 1993 but Bob almost got them back to the top Division in 1994, finishing very close to Norfolk Olympiades who took the final 5th promotion place.

Division Two saw the ladies 9th in 1995, 12th in 1996. and 16th in 1997. Sadly relegation in 1998 finishing 21st from the 25 clubs, bottom five being relegated.

Bob certainly experienced the "high" and "lows" of team management and must have been justifiably proud of his achievements; lets not forget two GRE Plate Cup victorieswinning team at Derby in 1992

And wins in the Alpha-Beta Trophy. AND coaching his daughter Emma to Great Britain international honours both as a multieventer and in individual throwing disciplines. Apart from his committee work, he also put a lot of time in as equipment officer and a coach.

Individually Bob, in his latter days, represented the club in the Eastern Masters Athletics League and his progress in the javelin

2005: Emma & Bob set club records in the same week and with the same javelin.

Emma held the existing ladies record with a best of 32.72m from 2004. In 2005 at the home SWL match she improved this to 33.88m. At the end of the season, Emma threw 34.56m at Peterborough(29th August)

Just six days later **Bob** represented MKAC in the EVAC final at Bedford on Sunday 4th September and set a M65 age javelin record throwing 26.45m.


Diane Baldwin and Barry Hearn awarded life membership

July 15: Ethan Wiltshire finishes fourth in the European U20 Champs 100m Final after three pbs

Ethan Wiltshire, representing Great Britain in Tallinn, Estonia at the European Junior Championships, qualified with some ease for the 100m semi-finals, by winning his heat in a new personal best time(10.50) into a headwind.

In the Semi-Final, in which there were four runners with better times, Ethan had another big personal best(10.34) to qualify for the Final. He now ranks second on the MMK all-time M20 rankings, ahead of Chris Clarke and Greg Rutherford but just behind Craig Pickering's club M20 record of 10.22.

Next day In the final, Ethan was up against two GB runners who had been selected ahead of him together with the cream of Europe, all of whom had much better times than he did going into the Championships. Unfazed, Ethan managed yet another personal best of 10.33 (w+1.3) in the final to miss a medal by 0.02

In the morning heats the GB team won comfortably (39.68) with a team that included the three 100m finalists- Toby Makoyawo, Ethan, Jeriel Quainoo plus Joseph Harding. In the Final, with the same team, they were similarly untroubled winning by 1/3rd of a second.








LEO FREELAND

Leo has now started attending University in the USA. He's at Wingate University, North Carolina studying for a degree in Political Science and will be running for their XC and T&F teams. New kit for Leo.



Leo has been a stalwart competitor for the Young Athletes teams since joining the Club some nine years ago. Starting in 2013 where he was runner-up in the Bucks AA u11 Championships over 600m(2.04.7).

Moving up to the u13's next year and by 2015 he had run 800m(2.40.99) and 1500m(5.28.2).

Coached by Sharon Edghill he improved to 2.12.21 (MK PB Special) for 800m and 4.33.57 for 1500m as an u15. In 2017 he finished 9th in the Chiltern XC League match at Luton.

2018/19 saw him competing in the u17's events and in 2018 he ran 2.01.65 (800m) and 4.17.8(1500m) in YDL matches and took 5th place in the home Chiltern League XC. Sub 2mins next year clocking 1.56.99 at Watford(3rd all-time M17) and 4.03.69 (1500m), 6th all-time And won the Chiltern XC race at Stopsley(Luton).

January 2020 produced another M17 XC win at Keysoe and on the track down to 4.02.29 in the YDL at Nuneaton. This summer has seen Leo in really fine form as an M20 with 1.55.82(800m) in a BMC meet(7th all-time). Then well under 4mins for 1500m, initially a PB of 3.53.88 at the BMC PB Special (photo below) and then with a best of 3.53.34 (placing 5th) at the English School(4th all-time). Also competing in the 3000mPB race with 8.34.53(6th all-time). AND a pace-maker at the 5km Special. We wish him well in his studies and look forward to following his athletics career.

Races in which men and women combined forces were a hit at the Olympics.
At the Paralympics they have gone further by uniting disability classifications over one lap of the track. Two men and two women from each nation are selected to cover visual impairment, limb

deficiency/impaired function, co-ordination disability and wheelchair racing.

Great Britain fielded a team comprising the Paralympic champions Libby Clegg and Jonnie Peacock alongside the T38 class sprinter Ali Smith and the wheelchair racer Nathan Maguire.

In a four-team field for the final on 3rd September, Great Britain were up against China, Japan and the United States. USA dominated from the start but a strong opening from Clegg, handing over to Peacock, earned Britain second position at halfway. China edged ahead in the third leg, run by Smith for Britain, with Maguire in a duel with the Japanese racer Suzuki Tomoki on the final 100m, which Maguire won. GB clocked 47.50

It seemed like bronze for Britain, which was still a cause for celebration on what looks set to be Clegg's last race after she confirmed her retirement from international competition. After a review, however, judges disqualified the Chinese team for an illegal handover and the British foursome were upgraded to silver.

"I'm so privileged and proud to be a part of this team and share this moment with these guys," Clegg said. "I won two Paralympic golds in Rio and it didn't make me happy, right now this is my proudest moment – being part of this team.

Dave Catlin ran 1:53.20 in the 1980 Finchley 20 before Dave March came on the scene who then improved this to 1:52.51. This time was eventually eclipsed some 25 years later by Marcin Fudalej, a Polish international runner who was competing for MKAC in 2012.

He ran 1:50.30 in the Oakley 20. **Top 10 rankings below** and the Finchley 20 appears no less than five times. A slight misnomer as the race was held in Hillingdon. In the 1970/80's it was one of the fastest 20milers in the UK and attracted many international runners. Lots more "head to head" racing in those days. Bill Adcocks ran 1:39.01 in 1972. The race was named by the then Finchley Harriers who later formed part of the newly formed Hillingdon AC.

The introduction of the MK Festival has seen more ladies running this distance and four have their PB from Milton Keynes. Jane Bird, the club's first sub 3-hour lady marathoner, held the record at 2:18.47 before Michelle Lee burst on the scene in the early 2000's. Still active in the cycling world


- a Silver Medal for Lara Moffat in the Hammer(49.80m), just 1cm behind the winner!

The SOAR MK5000 PB Special

(17 July) was held on a scorching hot day with

the mid-afternoon temperatures of 28 degrees Celsius. Many found the conditions too hot to handle with 31 of the 229 starters not making it to the finish line. Of the 198 who did finish, 88 produced new personal bests (44%).

The elite Men's and women's races both produced super fast times. The women's race, held in slightly cooler conditions at 8:20pm, involved a three way battle for the win between Abbie Donnelly(Lincoln), Morag Millar and Jenny Nesbitt with an inspired Abbie winning in 15:42.65 from Morag (15:43.57) and Jenny (15:44.90). Abbie took nearly 40 seconds off her personal best, with Morag taking over 25 seconds off hers. The winning time was just five seconds slower than Jess Judd's 2018 MK5000 Stadium Record.

As the men's race started the sun dipped below the horizon, the temperature cooled significantly and the wind dropped. Almost perfect conditions for racing produced some scorching hot times (much quicker than that in the England Athletics Championships in Bedford on the same day). Five men dipped under 14 minutes with Jack Rowe(Aldershot) taking the victory in a new stadium record of 13:41.40. The old record of 13:57.33 was set by Ben Bradley in 2019s MK5000.

This was merging the old British Athletics League & the UK Women's League where our women competed. After some consultation we decided to take up the offer. We were placed in National League Division One.

Last year because of Covid -19 and the various lockdowns suffered by the country there was no league competition to be had. So 2021 was our first venture into this new league. It was decided to split the Division one into more local venues to save travelling time and expense but for some reason we headed off to Portsmouth for our first match to compete against the host club, Belgrave Harriers and Reading AC

Portsmouth - June 5th

So Portsmouth it was. Coach travel was arranged but some athletes preferred to travel direct by car. This was understandable as Covid was still rife. The headline from our website went as follows:

"A small team travelled to the first ever National Athletics League meeting at Portsmouth and the distance to the meeting meant that several events were not covered.

A combination of Covid induced lack of readiness and those who were there put in some fine performances under the new performance-based scoring system. Eva Durand, with a throw of 43.35m in the Javelin, broke the Club F20 and Senior records and is now second in the Under 20 UK rankings.(Eva has since broken this record twice more)

Woman of the match was Kayleigh Presswell with a hammer throw of 60.88m. Also featuring in the top six performances were Sam Winters (twice), Lara Moffat (who won the Hammer "B"string with 50.19m and Eva"

Sam won the 800m in 1:54.50 and the 1500m in 3:54.66. Shawn Ampofo won the Triple Jump with a leap of 13.45m. It was a welcome return for Ebony Carr as she and Moyin Oduyemi had a 100m win double. Abigail Fitton won the 200m and Mia Soman the Pole Vault and the women took a 4×100 m relay victory.



Milton Keynes -July 3rd

Our second match was a home fixture. The female throwers did us proud again. Eva once again excelled in the Javelin recording 40.36m. Lara again won a hard fought Hammer competition recording 50.96m. Emma Beales threw the Discus out to 37.61m. Ebony again won the 100m with 12.03 with Moyin completing the double winning with 12.64.

Lateefa Agberemi proved what a superb athlete she is turning out to be. She won a brilliant treble in the 100m Hurdles, Triple Jump & Long Jump. Shawn achieved his own double with a victory in the Triple Jump (13.34m). Tim Penley duly won the Pole Vault. We finished the meeting with two wins in the 4 x 100m relay. FAREWELL TO MIKE LEONARD (Senior Sprints Coach)—

I first met Mike when I joined MMKAC in 1990. (31 years ago now!). I had just moved up to Milton Keynes and joined from Harrow A.C. I was coached in my early days with the club by Harry Northfield. Harry was not a sprints coach and it was suggested to me that I joined Mike Leonard's group. Mike was a Senior Sprints Coach – later to be renamed as a Level 4. In those days Brian Poland worked alongside Mike. I was then an M35 going on to be an M40 soon so we thought it would be an idea to me to become a sprints coach. Brian decided to pack up coaching and I was then coached solely by Mike for quite a few years. I then worked alongside Mike for many years and it was an excellent experience to gain my knowledge from him. It was Mike that gave me my report to go up from Level One to Level 2 in 1997 I do remember.

One of our fellow coach's at that time was Neil Wells. He was mainly into jumps coaching and his early charges included Mike's son Daniel, who went on to become our club's High Jump record holder. Neil also coached a young **Greg Rutherford**, who went on to become someone very well known. Greg joined Mike's speed sessions on many an occasion.

Some of Mike's athletes that he coached read like a who's who of sprint talent that this club has produced. Here are some of them:-

Craig Pickering — World Youth 100m Bronze medallist in Sherbrooke, Canada in 2003.

European Junior 100m GOLD -Champion — Kaunas, Lithuania in 2005

European Indoor Silver 60m — Birmingham 2007

European U23 Silver 100m — Debrecen, Hungary in 2007. His time was 10.14 w 0.2. (Legal personal best.) 4 x 100m GOLD

European Cup 100m GOLD — 4 x 100m GOLD — Munich, Germany in 2007.

Craig went on to represent G.B in the World Championships in Osaka, Japan in 2007 and the Olympics in Beijing, China in 2008. Incidentally Craig ran 10.08 w +2.1 coming

second to Usain Bolt in 2009.

Joey Duck- Commonwealth Youth Games Bronze in Bendigo, Australia 2004

European Juniors in Hengelo, Holland 2007

European U23 Championships - Kuanas, Lithuania 2009. Joey's personal best for 100m was 11.60 in 2009. She equalled that in 2015.

Ebony Carr – Had a brilliant year in 2018. At the World Junior Championships in Tampere, Finland she was part of the Bronze medal winning 4 x 100m. Her pb of 11.65 was set that year.

Mike also coached Natalie Jowett, Habee Folami, Daniel Oderinde, Maxwell Brown and Ethan Wiltshire until 2 years ago. (Ethan this year was part of the European U20 4 x 100m Bronze Medal winning team)

Some of Mike's fellow coaching team over the years at times included David Pickering (Craig's father), Rob Purton and Adam Poland. It was then decided that myself and Adam break away to form our own sprint group due to the large numbers of athletes coming along. Nowadays of course it is Panos who is my coaching partner.

AND it would be nice if he kept in touch to offer his pearls of wisdom. He is at times a quiet guy but speaks volumes of advice about sprinting. He watches the efficiency and movement of athletes and offers his biomechanical knowledge, He was winding down his coaching group in recent months and Panos and I have inherited some of his athletes such as Moyin Oduyemi.

It will be sad for Mike to leave us but life goes on. We wish him well for the future.

The MK Festival of Running on 5 September



The 2020 MK Festival of Running was held on 15 March with almost 3000 people completing one of four races over 5km, 10km, Half Marathon and 20 miles, well down on the 3500-4000 we were expecting to race. Undoubtedly, people were becoming nervous about the new virus that was causing havoc in China, Italy and Spain. A day later, all sporting events were cancelled and a week later, Britain went into lockdown.

This did not stop us planning for the 2021 Festival on 7 March. However, with a further lockdown in January, the decision was taken to move the event to 5 September, four weeks before the London Marathon. Entries for the race were much slower than in previous years as runners were nervous about entering events that might not happen, even though we were offering full refunds should the race be cancelled because of the pandemic. It was also clear that the running boom had been severely affected by covid-19 with fewer runners training and racing. The East Midlands Grand Prix Road Race series held later than normal from May to early August, attracted only half as many runners as in previous years. In August I attended the Big Half in London, an event that would normally attract around 25000 runners, but this year less than 10000 finished the race.

It was not looking good for the Festival, where the entry fees of the first 2000 just about cover all the expenses, which are fairly fixed independently of the number who race, and the entries above this mark contribute to the profits. In the end, just over 2500 runners entered this year's Festival, about half the number we normally achieve, which was probably the best we could have hoped for.

The club, as in previous years, was committed to providing over 100 helpers to marshal the event, man the feeding stations and help with registration, baggage and setting up the course. I worried that we would not be able to raise enough people because of the covid situation, so I arranged with a local retailer, Up and Running, to provide some vouchers as an extra incentive to persuade people to help.

In the end, this did the trick as between 110 and 120 people turned up to help on the day, despite some groups within the club choosing not to get involved.



The weather forecast for the day was for moderate temperatures. Indeed, there was no hint of how hot the day was going to turn out when four of us, Diane Baldwin, Richard Pownall, Ian Stewart and I, went round the course putting up all the signage. Even when the races started between 9:45am and 10:45am, the conditions were cool. The First Aid people reported that everything was quiet before midday. The 5km fun run finished with our own Kian Nicholson (pictured above, left) winning the event. The 10km race finished shortly afterwards and everything was fine. Elliot Hind, (pictured above, right) first man home in the 20 mile race had pretty good conditions throughout his run.

Sometime after midday, the temperature rose to the high 20s, 10 degrees higher than had been forecast. Some of the less experienced runners started collapsing on the course, at the finish and after the finish. Fortunately, we had three ambulances in attendance, but they were being kept very busy. As race director, I was working with Jackson Ryan to despatch the ambulances to the right points to quickly get to people in trouble. The on-course radios were passing messages to the finish. I was called to two people in trouble outside the XScape Building and there was a woman in trouble in Campbell Park just below Belvedere.

Throughout this the marshals were fantastic, offering advice, support and encouragement. At the end of the day, this is what this event is about. I salute everyone who helped make this event the success it undoubtedly was.
